Firstly, on behalf of the Canadian Museum of Civilization, I would like to thank you for your interest the Museum, and specifically in the Teacher Resources section of our website that includes material relating to the First Peoples Hall.

I would also like to compliment you on your website; it looks like a great resource that is easy to navigate, full of interesting information, links and beautiful images.

You have submitted a very interesting and worthy proposal; however, I regret that CMC cannot accommodate your requested permissions for the following reasons:

Copyright

_

Many of the thousands of artifacts and documents within the First People's Hall are subject to copyright law.

In order to provide reproductions of these many items, we would firstly have to research each and every artifact/document to ensure copyright status and adherence to Copyright Legislation. Our research fees are normally billed at \$50.00 per hour. For many of the items in our exhibit, we have permission to use, but we do not own their copyright. In those cases, the copyright owners would have to be contacted (by you) in order to obtain copyright permission.

Secondly, once permissions are determined, we would have to apply user fees as appropriate. Just to give you a rough idea of the potential costs, one still image on a website would cost \$50.00 per year, or \$200.00 for a maximum of five years.

Competition

Although wanting to disseminate information as a public good, we believe that it is not in the best interest of CMC for copies of large amounts of its material to be presented on other Websites. Such direct competition could adversely impact visits to our website, and, making our material available is best met through accessibility on our own website.

Human Resources

A major disadvantage of providing text and photos directly to external organizations is that there needs to be a process in place to export, monitor and update the provided content. I regret that we are simply unable to supply someone to perform this function.

Technology

As you have no doubt experienced, technology changes on a regular basis. For us to provide our modules would require us to manipulate them to accommodate your web platform. Regrettably, we do not have the resources to do so.

Reproduction

The advantage of linking to us, rather than us providing you with material, is that the content will always be up-to-date and accurate. It removes the onus on you to ensure that the information is still appropriate.

We base the use of CMCC materials on other websites on an identification of a limited number of specific items, restricted to information, and not to design elements. Otherwise, including design elements could contribute to creating public confusion.

Although we cannot grant you your requested permissions, we do wish to share our information and artifacts with the public. We therefore encourage you to post a hyperlink directly to our site/pages thereby providing your users with high quality images and current information.

We thank you for your understanding in this matter and would look forward to your interest in linking with us.

Good afternoon,

Your proposal may be of interest. I will look over the sites you indicated to try and get a feel for what they cover.

However, there are other priorities that may not make this feasible for the immediate future - the Truth and Reconciliation Commission ((TRC) for Indian Residential Schools) will soon begin document collection, and I am sure that will have significant impact on me and my job priorities for the next while. I am but a one-person operation for the most part, and there is some concern about the amount of material that may be requested by the TRC, and therefore the amount of my time that will be taken up in preparing this material for disclosure.

Currently, the only materials I am in the process of digitizing are photographs. This may be the easiest first step but I do have many questions relating to this and other materials:

- 1. At what resolution do you expect digitized material to be made available?
 - a. In addition to photos, I have quite an extensive collection of postcards that were created from scenes of the North and used to encourage donations to the Missionary effort in Canada. These obviously do not reproduce as clearly as photos, but do present a fascinating view of early 20th Century life in the North.
- 2. Since most of our material is housed in a public facility the Provincial Archives of Alberta (PAA), there is an agreement in place that allows the PAA to generate revenues from the reproduction and sale of these images and other materials. I would want to make sure that any arrangement honours this pre-existing agreement so that it would only be research copies (ie: for photos under 100dpi with our source information and photo number embedded on each image (or an appropriate watermark) that could be made available through your site.
 - a. I hope to have digital research copies available through their (PAA) web

interface in the near future (similar to what has been done for other Archival institutions across Canada).

- 3. Some of the other material (audio-visual) that may be of interest needs to be re-formatted (in a digital form). While the PAA has the facilities to re-format most of the material, there is a cost involved and I currently do not have a budget for this. This may have to be discussed at a later date.
- 4. Because copyright still exists on much of the other (paper-based) material, I have concerns that relate to protecting the copyright and ownership of the material, as well as ensuring the context and purpose of the material remains intact. For that reason, I generally do not allow entire manuscripts or unpublished material to be reproduced in anyway.
 - a. It may be possible to consider only that which has been published and for which copyright has passed or still remains with the Oblates.
- 5. Because the material is currently in an archival facility (where it has been arranged and described and identified in a finding aid), general practice does not allow for it to be removed certainly it would be impossible to move the material, even temporarily, to Montreal is there another option?

As you are no doubt aware, the Grandin Province archival material generally relates to the Western and Central Arctic, and a good deal is in French, which was the Native tongue for most of the early missionaries.

I look forward to the opportunity to discuss this further with you. In preparation for that, if you could give me a more detailed idea of what you envision as the role of our archives and how it can be achieved without significant loss of copyright, control and the revenues generated for the PAA each year, I will be happy to review this and discuss it further with my employers.

I am usually at this office (at the PAA) on Tuesdays and Thursdays from about 7:00am to 3:00pm M ST should you wish to contact me or should you have additional questions for me.

Thank you for your interest in Rekindling Traditions. Isuma is certainly a fascinating company.

Even though I took early retirement in 2006, I continue to work on projects related to combining Indigenous knowledge and Eurocentric science in school science programs. One example: we're having unprecedented success here in Saskatchewan with the collaboration between a publisher and Elders in producing science textbooks (grades 6, 7, and 8 so far) to support science teachers' inclusion of Indigenous knowledge (now in the science curriculum), which of course means teachers need to learn the knowledge first, which in turn means they must forge a relationship with Indigenous knowledge keepers in their community (as required by the Ministry of Education). Enhancing Indigenous cultures, which includes language of course, is a goal.

I am not certain about the time it would take on my part if I accepted your most thoughtful invitation to join Isuma by giving Rekindling Traditions its own site, using the Inuit Culture Education site as a template. I understand you have resources to help me, but my time commitment to the project is not clear. My concern stems from my lack of appreciating what you mean by either (a) uploading our content directly to a new channel and letting you integrate it into the site; or (b) "sending" our material to you and getting you to design the channel from our offices with my assistance. Our Rekindling Traditions site is maintained by the College of Education. Would this status change? Is it simply a matter of someone at the College sending you a copy of the site?
